

TAA Dominican Republic Mission Trip

In March, a group of twenty TAA students, accompanied by three staff chaperones, arrived in the capital city of Santo Domingo. After boarding a bus and traveling approximately 150 miles west along the southern coast of the Dominican Republic we arrived tired, hungry and eager to get some sleep in the coastal town of Barahona.

It was here in Barahona, that Pastor Teofilo Pichardo established the "Southern Missionary Camp" which would be our primary living and working location for the week. Full-time missionaries do live and serve out of the Southern Missionary Camp, engaging with the local community, teaching English and providing clean water to the community.

Pastor Teofilo Richardo's vision for the Southern Mission Camp, is to create accommodations and amenities that house up to 1,000 people; complete with a large church, cafeteria, dormitories, activity centers, sports facilities and more to serve the needs of the growing community.

We knew the living conditions would be humble as the "camp" was still in development.

Currently, the camp consists of a few two-story cinder block buildings which served as our living quarters, bathrooms, meeting rooms, kitchen, etc. Additional levels, rooms and out-buildings were in a state of partial construction but illustrated Pastor Teofilo Pichardo's larger vision for the property.



There was no A/C, the electricity frequently went out, and the water was gravity-fed from storage containers on the roof. Daily, a pump truck arrived to refill the containers, which meant showers, toilets, and sinks frequently ran out of water until the truck delivered our new supply. In the beginning, these seemed like tremendous inconveniences, but after a few days, we all adapted to the routine and patterns of camp life.

Our task for the week was to assist local workers in building walls, moving cinder blocks, mixing concrete and general tasks around the main campus. Early on, it was also found that additional translators were needed at some of the evening church programs, so several of our students also volunteered.

A truck would come and deliver shipments of cinder blocks that would be stacked in massive piles near the entrance of the camp. Students would form assembly lines to relocate the blocks to their needed destinations. Blocks had to be hand lifted up to a platform, then hoisted up again to the roof level where students would move them to their new locations. One student estimated that we moved over 40,000 lbs. of blocks one day alone.





It wasn't all work and no play, as Pastor Pichardo made sure to include some sightseeing and visits to some nearby attractions. We saw San Rafael Falls, Los Patos River (the shortest river in the world) and we had Sabbath worship on the mountain next to camp. The most exotic excursion was an all-day trip to Las Aguilas Bay. This is a pristine and protected white sand beach considered to be one of the most beautiful beaches in the world. We spent several hours swimming, snorkeling, and getting sunburnt in this amazing natural wonder. Thankfully, the sun burns were not severe and everyone returned to camp safely.

Despite grueling humidity, a rather unique food experience, traveler's sickness and constantly broken toilets I was delighted in the positive and helpful attitudes our students. We had wonderful, life changing experience, made new friends, helped the camp move closer to its amazing vision of being available to serve 1,000 people, and participated in church programs resulting in 20 baptisms and many recommitments to Jesus Christ. We also grew closer to each other and to God through this experience. We know the Lord was with us and we are thankful we had this opportunity to serve Him and participate in this part of the Great Commission.



Campus Updates: New Maintenance Facility & Solar Pannels

With a history spanning over 104 years, our TAA campus has undergone a significant transformation. Originally an airfield, it has hosted various industries and opportunities, with buildings being continually repurposed for different uses. For instance, the old TAA maintenance building on the north side of the campus was once an airplane hangar and has since served many purposes, including graduation ceremonies, classes, and class banquets.

The old maintenance building was torn down at the beginning of this year to make way for something new. In its place, TAA is constructing a 16,000square-foot state-of-the-art maintenance facility. This facility will house various departments, including but not limited to woodworking, metal fabrication, plumbing, storage for our motor pool, and a small office working area. The focus is on looking forward, providing a safe space for our maintenance department to work, and offering a trade school classes and certification for our students.





Motor pool storage is a significant addition as well. The new maintenance shop provides space for the fleet of seven vehicles, three buses, two vooses, and two vans, all of which can be stored and maintained under shaded cover from the sun.

We are excited about this new building as we look forward to the future and the opportunities it provides to not only maintain and improve the facilities but also to help serve the students at TAA and providing them with new opportunities to EXCEL.


In addition to developing a new maintenance facility, TAA is taking significant steps toward sustainability by installing solar panels on campus. These solar panels will reduce the campus's electricity bill to nearly if not completely, net zero. The panels will be installed on shade structures, including car coverings in the southwest parking lot in front of the administration building, the southeast parking lot in front of the music building, the east side parking lot of the science building, and three shaded areas around the cafeteria.


The shade structures are a welcome addition to the campus, providing not only a means to harness solar energy but shaded areas for student, staff, and visitor parking, as well as covered spaces for students to relax when it is very hot. With the installation of solar panels, TAA will soon be able to power all of the school's facilities, including classrooms, administrative offices, dormitories, the cafeteria, and the gymnasium.

Future expansion of the system will include solar panels to meet the power demands of the new maintenance building. It is an exciting time as we take advantage of Arizona's abundant sunshine, creating a more sustainable future for our campus.


Alumni and friends of TAA, it is time to honor the legacy of this building with a much-needed renovation, bringing it the care and attention it deserves. By revitalizing the auditorium, we ensure it continues to inspire and nurture future generations with the same warmth and significance it has always held. This renovation will also meet modern standards and support the growth of our music and performing arts programs.

The project will be divided into three phases to assist with planning and funding: the stage, the ceiling & walls, and the main floor. This year, TAA is focusing on fundraising for the stage renovation.

This renovation will include:

- repairing and expanding the stage floor with more durable materials.
- Replace the temporary stage creating more usable stage space and greater visibility for the audience
- Adding a safety handrail for the stage steps
- Adding a curved sound wall and LED video panel on the back wall.
- Installing a stage lighting gallery for better access to spotlights and other updated stage lighting features

Arizona Adventist Scholarships, Inc.

How Tax Credits Work with AASI, Inc.

A tax credit is different than a normal donation made to a charity. Instead of reducing your taxable federal income, the tax credit donation reduces what you owe!

Each year state of Arizona sets a cap on the donation limit for single tax filers and those filing taxes as married/joint. This determines the maximum amount taxpayers can expect to receive as dollar-for-dollar credit against their tax liability. In 2021, this amount is \$1,219 for single taxpayers, and \$2,435 for married taxpayers filing joint.

To get the tax credit, donors must report their donation to the Department of Revenue either on paper tax form or via an online tax filing program. Donations can be made up to April 15th each year but needs to be made prior to filing your taxes. Tax credit donations made on or before April 15th can still be claimed on the previous year's taxes.

Donations must be made through AASI, not sent to a church or to the child's school to receive a tax credit from the State. Donations are received and distributed by AASI in the form of tuition scholarships.

Arizona's Private School Tax Credit allows you to give a donation to Arizona Advenstist Scholarships Inc. to provide scholarships for school-aged children.



File Your State Taxes



Arizona Adventists Scholarships, Inc. will send you a receipt to include when you file your state taxes.



Receive Your Tax Credit



In exchange for your donation, you can get a direct, dollar-for-dollar credit toward the amount you pay in Arizona state taxes.



Provide Scholarships



Arizona Adventist Scholarships, Inc. then awards scholarships to children attending Adventist schools in Arizona.

Note: A school tuition organization cannot award, restrict or reserve scholarships solely on the basis of donor recommendation. A taxpayer may not claim a tax credit if the taxpayer agrees to swap donations with another taxpayer to benefit either taxpayer's own dependent. A.R.S. § 43-1603 (B) (3)

Donations can be made in person, by mail, online, or via phone call to the AZ Adventist Scholarship office. Scholarships are awarded four times per school year in October, December, February and May. To have your donation included in a particular award date, plan on donating at least three weeks in advance of the award month.
